FACULTY

J. RANDLE ADAIR, DO, PHD

Dr. Adair received his BS in Biology at Georgetown in 1969, his PhD in Neurophysiology at Emory University in 1974, and medical degree at Nova Southeastern University in 1997.

His postdoctoral training includes being a Pharmacology Fellow at Georgetown Univ. Medical School (1976-1978) and the Chemical Dependency Training Institute of University of Miami (1986), after which he participated in the development and implementation of Project Trust, a novel school-based alcohol and drug intervention and treatment program in Miami-Dade (FL) public schools.

He is, as a physician, certified by the American Boards of Internal Medicine and Addiction Medicine.

He is currently Division Chief of Internal Medicine and Attending Hospitalist at Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He serves as Chair of the Physician Aid Committee, Co-Chair of the Stroke Task Force, and Chair of the Anticoagulation Subcommittee.

TERRY L. ALLEY, MD, FAAFP, FASAM

Terry Alley was born and raised in Shawnee Mission, Kansas, educated at the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana, and received his Medical Degree at the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine in Oklahoma City. He is board certified in Family Practice and Certified in Addiction Medicine by ASAM. He is a fellow of AAFP and a fellow of ASAM. He is a diplomate of the American Board of Addiction Medicine. He was in solo practice in family medicine from 1975 to 1985 and has limited his practice to Addiction Medicine since 1985. He is currently the Medical Director of Bradford Health Services in Warrior, Alabama. He has given presentations at the local, state, regional, national and international level.

BURNS M. BRADY, MD, ASAM, FASAM, ABFP, FAAFP

Dr. Burns M. Brady is a 1964 graduate of the University of Louisville Medical School and completed his internship and residency training at St. Joseph's Infirmary in Louisville.

Dr. Brady is a member of numerous professional medical organizations, including the local, state and national medical associations, the American Academy of Family Practice and is a Fellow of the American Society of Addiction Medicine. He is a Board-certified family physician and a Board-certified addictionologist.

Dr. Brady is an addiction consultant for a 400-bed men and women's homeless shelter, The Healing Place, which has been recognized as one of the top five in the United States.

Dr. Brady recently retired as the Medical Director of the Kentucky Physicians Health Foundation-Impaired Physicians Program. He is a clinical instructor on alcoholism for the University of Louisville, University of Kentucky, and Pikeville Schools of Medicine; and has served as a consultant to the American Bar Association, Kentucky Bar Association, Kentucky Dental Association and Kentucky Nurses Association on issues of professional impairment.

Dr. Brady is currently involved in a volunteer capacity with Luther Lockett and Roederer Correctional Institutions in LaGrange, KY, bringing the 12-Step recovery text book model to those inmates.

SUSAN J CAMPLING, RN, PsyD, CSAT-S, CSOT, COVT

Susan J Campling, RN, Psy.D is a Certified Sexual Addictions Therapist and Supervisor, a Certified Sexual Offender Therapist and a Certified Domestic Violence Therapist who is the national spokesperson for the Keystone Center ECU and PAC Program. Dr. Campling is past director of the ECU and founder and director of the Professional Assessment Center. She has presented mainly on issues related to trauma, addiction and compulsive behaviors among a variety of populations including physicians and other health care professionals.

BRIAN FINGERSON, RPH

Brian Fingerson is Adjunct Assistant Professor at the University of Kentucky College of Pharmacy, Sullivan University College of Pharmacy, and is a faculty member at the University of Utah School on Alcoholism and Other Drug Dependencies. He is President of Kentucky Professionals Recovery Network-KYPRN, a company formed to educate health care professionals about the disease of chemical dependency. KYPRN administers the recovery programs for the pharmacy, dentistry, veterinary medicine, respiratory care, optometry, and physical therapy professions and is involved in assisting chemically dependent health professionals in their recovery process and supporting their return to active practice. He has worked in this field since 1986.

Mr. Fingerson has presented at a multitude of conferences and seminars at the local, state, and national levels.

JAMES T. JENNINGS, MD

Dr. Jennings is a native of Louisville, Kentucky. He attended Transylvania University, where he obtained his BA in biology and then continued his studies at the University of Louisville medical school, graduating in 1996. His residency in Family Medicine was completed at the University of Louisville.

FACULTY

Following his residency training, Dr. Jennings was in private practice in family medicine at Southend Medical Clinic. He began his work there in 1998 and stayed until January 2008.

In 2006 Dr. Jennings was appointed as a member of the Kentucky Physicians Health Foundation's Impaired Physician Committee and served in that capacity until accepting the position of Medical Director of the Foundation in January 2008. Dr. Jennings has given presentations throughout the state of Kentucky on the various aspects of physician impairment as well as disruptive behavior in the medical community.

Dr. Jennings is a diplomate of the American Board of Family Physicians and a member of the American Academy of Family Practice and the American Society of Addiction Medicine. He is also a member of the CAPTASA Conference Planning Committee. He continues to reside in Louisville with his wife and son.

ROBERT W. MOONEY, MD, MAC

Dr. Mooney is a son of Dr. John and Mrs. Dot Mooney, founders of Willingway Hospital, Statesboro, Georgia. He has devoted his life to Addiction Medicine and the treatment of addicts and their family members affected by chemical dependence. Dr. Mooney is certified in Addiction Medicine by the American Society of Addiction Medicine. He has been continuously certified as an Addiction Counselor since 1986 and currently holds a Masters Addiction Counselor Certification from the National Association of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselors. He is a Diplomat to the American Psychotherapy Association. He has lectured extensively across the United States and internationally.

HERBERT E. "BUD" NEWMAN, PSY D, CADC, CCGC

Dr. Newman currently is a Clinical Manager at The Morton Center in Louisville, KY. He is in charge of the IOP Program, Chemical Dependency Treatment Program and the Pathological Gambling Program. Dr. Newman is certified as both an alcohol and drug counselor and a compulsive gambling counselor.

Dr. Newman started working in the helping profession in 1967 working in Residential Services for the Department of Child Welfare. He continued working with adolescents in both residential and non-residential programs until 1973 when he went into the private business sector. Even though he was in the private business sector he did not stop working with youth. He was active in Scouting and coached softball for many years.

He continued working in the private business sector and the

helping profession until 1994, when he started working with people suffering from addictive disorders and their families. In 1999, Dr. Newman attended a two day training program on Pathological Gambling and this grew into a passion that continues even today.

It was the result of this initial training program, the subsequent training that he received from his mentor, Dr. Curtis Bairett, the time he spent working in an out-patient clinic in Las Vegas, NV and the numerous hours working with gamblers that brought him to the point that he recognized that he along with many of his helping professional brothers and sisters had treated numerous pathological gamblers - he just was not knowledgeable enough to ask the right questions and make the correct diagnosis.

Today Dr. Newman's passion surrounds treating the gambler and his/her family, but also to share what he has learned with other professionals so that they too can make an impact in treating this disorder, helping the compulsive gambler into recovery and bringing serenity and peace to the gambler and their families.

Dr. Newman is honored to be serving his fourth term as President of the Kentucky Council on Problem Gambling. He also sits on the American Compulsive Gambling Counselor Certification Board, chairing the Ethics Committee. He has developed and presented on both the local and national levels for other helping professions and professionals on problem gambling.

The consistent message being that Pathological Gambling is grossly undiagnosed and untreated, not because professionals don't care, but rather that they don't know what to look for and Pathological Gambling is just not on the clinical radar screen.

ALEXIS POLLES, MD

Dr. Polles is an Addiction Psychiatrist who serves as the Director of Psychiatric Services at COPAC Addiction Treatment Center in Brandon, MS. She has worked in the field for over 20 years. She is a Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and a Diplomat of the American Board of Addiction Medicine. She is a certified EMDR therapist, certified by the National Acupuncture Detoxification Association, and has completed the comprehensive training course on acupuncture for physicians through the University of California at Irvine. She lectured widely in the gulf south to hospital staff and other service providers on acute and chronic effects of trauma after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

PATRICK J. SAMMON, PHD

Dr. Sammon is a professor emeritus, Department of Physiology, University of Kentucky College of Medicine and has a joint

appointment with the Department of Oral Health Science, University of Kentucky College of Dentistry. Dr. Sammon received his Bachelor of Science and Masters of Science degrees in Chemistry/Biochemistry from Xavier University in 1963. He was awarded membership in Alpha Sigma Nu, National Jesuit Honor Society in 1960. He received his Doctorate degree in Physiology and Biophysics from the University of Louisville School of Medicine in 1968. He was honored to full membership in the Society of the Sigma Xi for promotion of research in science in 1968. During Dr. Sammon's tenure at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine and Dentistry he was course director for several courses: Physiology and Pharmacology for Dental Students, Oral Hard Tissues for both pre- and post-graduate students and Drug Abuse, Misuse and Dependency. He has also lectured on drug abuse and addiction issues in the Colleges of Pharmacy and Social Work. Dr Sammon was named Associate with the Center on Drug and Alcohol Abuse Research at the University of Kentucky in 1993 and was involved in drug abuse prevention education and drug survey research with dental students and dentists and has published in these areas. He has served with the Advisory Committee on Chemical Dependency Issues, Council on Dental Practice American Dental Association and was a consultant and trainer for the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention Medical Specialty Program. He was involved in developing the ADNAAADS Curriculum Guidelines for Education in Substance Abuse, Alcoholism, and Other Chemical Dependencies. He was also Section Co-Leader, Dental Section, University of Utah School on Alcoholism and Other Drug Dependencies, University of Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah for ten years. Dr. Sammon is an instructor for the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center and Counter Drug Task Force Training Programs and developed six satellite teleconference courses for the task force training programs. Dr. Sammon is also a speaker for the American Dental Association's Seminar Series and presents programs covering prescription and methamphetamine drug abuse and addiction. He currently teaches health professionals, law enforcement, and educational organizations continuing education courses dealing with alcohol and other drug misuse, abuse and addiction at the local, state, national and international levels.

SCOTT A. TEITELBAUM, MD, FAAP, ASAM

Originally from Staten Island, New York, Dr. Teitelbaum received his undergraduate degree in Psychology at Lehigh University. He attended medical school at Rochester University. Completing his residency in Pediatrics at the University of Connecticut, Dr. Teitelbaum served in private practice for ten

years at Teitelbaum & Katz Pediatrics in Middletown, Connecticut after which he completed his Postdoctoral Fellowship in Addiction Medicine under the mentorship of Dr. Mark Gold and Dr. Kenneth Thompson at the University of Florida. Additionally, Dr. Teitelbaum completed a fellowship in Child Psychiatry at the University of Florida. Joining the Faculty in 2002, Dr. Teitelbaum serves as the Medical Director for the Florida Recovery Center, Director of Adolescent Recovery Services and Clinical Associate Professor for the Department of Psychiatry as well as the Department of Pediatrics. Additionally, he currently serves as the Clinical Chief of the Addiction Medicine Division within the Department of Psychiatry. His expertise in Addiction Medicine goes beyond chemical dependence and includes an intensive, in depth knowledge of compulsive gambling. He has been involved in the treatment and evaluation of compulsive gamblers on a statewide level. Dr. Teitelbaum currently serves as an Expert Panelist and Speaker for The National Youth Anti-Drug Media Campaign which is sponsored by The White House, Office of National Drug Control Policy. In addition to being board certified as a Pediatrician, Dr. Teitelbaum is certified by the American Society of Addiction Medicine and is a certified medical review officer.

Clinical Interests

Dr. Teitelbaum is the Medical Director of Addiction Services at the Florida Recovery Center and serves as the Clinical Division Chief for Addiction Medicine in the Department of Psychiatry. He was originally trained in Pediatrics at the Connecticut Children's Medical Center in Hartford. After engaging in private practice for over ten years, Dr. Teitelbaum went on to do further training in Addiction Medicine and child psychiatry until eventually taking a position at the University of Florida of both Director of Addiction Services and Director of Adolescent Addiction. In addition, Dr. Teitelbaum is the Medical Director of the Florida Recovery Center Partial Hospitalization Program, which represents an intensive level of treatment for patients living in off-campus housing, while attending daily treatment at Shands at Vista and the Springhill Professional Center. Due to his expertise in Adolescent Addiction Medicine, Dr. Teitelbaum does numerous evaluations and treatment of adolescents with drug related issues.

Educational Interests and Accomplishments

Dr. Teitelbaum is involved in the daily teaching of both third and fourth year medical students from the University of Florida, School of Medicine. The students round with him on a daily basis and receive clinical teaching as well as the fundamental education of Addition Medicine. In addition, Dr. Teitelbaum provides lectures to medical students from the various medical disciplines at the University of Florida. His lectures include gen-

eral addiction principles as well as the treatment of impaired professionals. His teaching has been highly regarded by the numerous students who have rotated through his service. In addition to his local teaching, Dr. Teitelbaum has been invited to speak at numerous facilities around the country. Dr. Teitelbaum has been the Key Note Speaker at the Delaware Annual Conference on Addiction and Prevention as well as presenting Ground Rounds at numerous hospitals in various states, including Creighton Children's Hospital and the Children's Medical Center of Connecticut. In addition, Dr. Teitelbaum has been consulted by the White House, Executive Office of the President to help with the media campaign on the use of marijuana by children and adolescents. In addition to the White House, Dr. Teitelbaum serves as a consultant for the New York Yankees as well as numerous media outlets such as 24-Hours and The O'Reilly Factor.

Leadership and Service

Dr. Teitelbaum has been involved in a leadership role locally in the treatment and intervention of many local professionals. He has volunteered his time to help with interventions of professionals with addictive disorders. Dr. Teitelbaum has also been involved in the identification and treatment of medical students and residents with addiction related problems. He also volunteers his time for educational lectures at numerous local public schools, providing school age children with the awareness of the dangers of drug use. Additionally, Dr. Teitelbaum serves as an active board member of the Florida Society of Addiction Medicine as well as Florida Medical Professionals Group (FMPG). He also has been honored with the University of Florida Exemplary Teacher Award for two consecutive years/academic years 2005-06 and 2006-07.

MATTHEW VEROFF, LCSW

Matthew Veroff is a licensed clinical social worker who owns and conducts a private practice in Louisville, Kentucky. He has been a therapist in the community for the past thirty years. He has been a leader in the development of issue specific treatment for families and individuals where family violence has occurred. He has provided training and consultation on a local, regional and national level.

WILL W. WARD, MD, FACP, FASAM

Dr. Ward is a native Kentuckian having spent his early years in Georgetown, Frankfort and Shelby County. He was elected to Phi Beta Kappa and received a B.A. from the Johns Hopkins University in 1950. He received his M.D. and was elected to Alpha Omega Alpha at the University of Louisville in 1954. The following four years were spent in postgraduate training in

internal medicine at the University of Pennsylvania and University of Michigan Hospitals. He served as Chief of Professional Services at the 7244th USAF Hospital in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia in 1958 and 1959.

He returned to the private practice of internal medicine in Louisville in 1960 continuing this through 1998 and since has devoted himself to the field of addiction medicine. He was certified by the American Board of Internal Medicine in 1961, 1974, 1980 and 1987 and by the American Society of Addiction Medicine in 1996. He has been elected to fellowship in both the American College of Physicians and the American Society of Addiction Medicine.

Dr. Ward has been involved in a wide variety of community activities in the Louisville area. These have included Chairman of the American Red Cross Disaster Committee, President of the Jefferson County (now Greater Louisville) Medical Society, founding president of the Wellness Forum, Chairman of the Medical Advisory Board of the Kentucky Kidney Foundation and President of the Norton Hospital Medical Staff as well as roles in numerous other organizations.

In 1989 Dr. Ward became the founding president of The Healing Place a social model recovery program for homeless men and women addicted to alcohol and other drugs. This program currently serves daily more than 400 men, women and women with children in Louisville. This model has been widely replicated in Kentucky, the U.S., and abroad. His service as president continued through 2001. He has received numerous awards for this work including Citizen Laureate for 1998 from the Younger Woman's Club of Louisville and Ephraim McDowell Physician of the Year in 2000 as well as service awards from the University of Louisville, the American College of Physicians and various other community organizations.

Dr. Ward has been a member of the Clinical Faculty of the University of Louisville School of Medicine since 1960 and a Clinical Professor of Medicine since 1981. He currently is a member of Norton Community Medical Associates and also teaches a course in addiction medicine at The Healing Place as part of the Introduction to Clinical Medicine curriculum for medical students. He has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Physicians Health Foundation since 1996 and its chairman since 2004. His primary interest in the addiction field has focused on the medical problems associated with drug use.

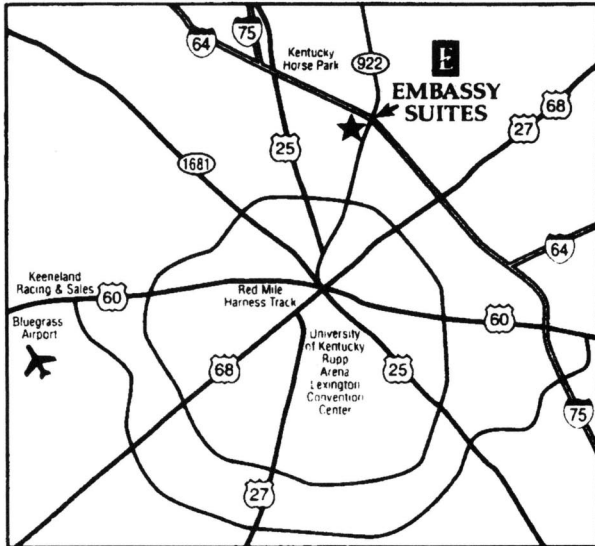
