Back the the Future: The History of Addiction Medicine, Then and Now.
– Scott Teitelbaum, MD, FAAP, FASAM



Scott Teitelbaum, MD,

Scott Teitelbaum, M.D., is the Pottash Professor in Psychiatry and Neuroscience at the University of Florida's College of Medicine, where he serves as Vice Chair of the Department of Psychiatry, Chief of the Division of Addiction Medicine, Medical Director of the UF Health Florida Recovery Center, and former Fellowship Director of UF's American Board of Preventative Medicine (ABPM) – Addiction Medicine fellowship.

Originally trained and board-certified as a pediatrician, Dr. Teitelbaum later completed fellowships in addiction medicine and child psychiatry at the University of Florida. Dr. Teitelbaum became medical director of the Florida Recovery Center in 2002, and since then has been involved in the evaluation and/or treatment of more than 5,000 healthcare providers and other professionals from across the country. Through his efforts, the Florida Recovery Center has led the way nationally with its evidence-based treatment of the disease of addiction.

Dr. Teitelbaum developed one of the first-ever accredited fellowships in addiction medicine. His program now has trained more addiction-medicine fellows than any other program nationwide. In 2016, Dr. Teitelbaum was awarded the Pottash Endowment, allowing for the creation of a research initiative that's focused on addiction medicine and the fight toward recovery. He has been honored on multiple occasions with the Exemplary Teacher Award for his guidance of medical students.

Dr. Teitelbaum has received multiple awards and honors, including in January 2018, the American Society of Addiction Medicine named Dr. Teitelbaum winner of its

Robert A. Campbell, MD, II, FASAM, FACS (ret) is an Addiction Psychiatrist with 37 years of experience as a physician. He received his undergraduate and medical degrees from the University of Florida (1985). He then completed a residency in General Surgery (1990) at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, TX. Dr. Campbell was a Cardiothoracic Surgeon for many years and completed his fellowship in Cardiothoracic Surgery at the University of Miami (1992). After retiring from surgery Dr. Campbell went back into training and completed a residency in Psychiatry at the University of Louisville (2013). Dr. Campbell also served as the Medical Director for the Clinics at The Healing Place in Louisville, KY. After serving on the faculty at the University of Louisville Department of Psychiatry, where he served as an addiction, consult/liason and emergency services psychiatrist, he moved to Columbus, Ohio to become the Medical Director, Director of Addiction Services, and the Dual Diagnosis Unit at Columbus Springs East in Columbus, OH. He is currently an Attending Psychiatrist at Twin Valley Behavioral Health in Columbus OH, which is the state forensics hospital. He is on the Clinical Faculty at the University of Louisville, The Ohio State University, Ohio University, and Wright State University Departments of Psychiatry. He is certified by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, as well as the American Board of Preventative Medicine in Ad-

Roeske, MD Certificate of Excellence in Medical Student Education, awarded annually by the American Psychiatric Association. He has been an active member of numerous Ethics Committees during his medical career. He has also been a member of the Professional Standards Committee, Patient Safety Committee, Workplace Violence Committee, Emotional Debriefing and Staff Self-Care Committee, and the Opioid Task Force Committee at University of Louisville. Justin earned a master's in counseling with a specialization in rehabilitation from Adler University. He is a certified alcohol and drug counselor (CADC), certified rehabilitation counselor (CRC), and a problematic and compulsive gambling counselor (PCGC). Before joining Footprints to Recovery, Justin served in several roles at Linden Oaks Behavioral Health, including manager of outpatient addiction services,

clinical supervisor of addiction services, and lead clinical therapist. He has also worked in private practice and as a counselor for youth and family services organizations
